<b><u>ENGLISH</u></b> Reading	Aim to read as often as possible. If you have any brothers or sisters, offer to read to them. If you would like to send a video on Seesaw it would be lovely to see how you are improving. <u>Comprehension – ‘Room on the Broom’</u> – watch the <u>Powerpoint</u> (or read the book if you have it) then choose to answer the <u>comprehension questions</u> Remember <u>Oxford Owl website</u> for extra books <u>Ruth Miskin website</u> for phonics
Spellings/Handwriting	Practise the spellings using the <u>spelling sheets</u> then test yourself on Friday. Use the <u>wordsearch</u> to help with your skimming and scanning skills. Perhaps you could make your own wordsearch using the Year 2 spellings. If you send a picture, it can be shared with everyone else on Seesaw.
Writing /SPAG	<u>SPAG 1</u> choose the level which best suits you (-, = or +) <u>SPAG 2</u> – homophone question matching <u>Write your own spell</u> –see Powerpoint below.
